CONDITIONS OF ENTRY

- A. Entries are limited to residents living or owning land in Lane County, Oregon. Management reserves the right to reject any exhibit offered, to limit entries according to space available and to eliminate classes if insufficient entries are received.
- B. Pre-registration is required and will be accepted ONLINE through our website at www.atthefair.com or by mail. **Entry deadline is July 31st, at midnight.** Changes to any entry can be made on the day entries are actually accepted.
- C. **Bring your entries to "Expo 1" on Tuesday, August 16th between Noon and 7:00 p.m.** Community Collectives and GWA's enter Saturday, Sunday, August 13th, 14th, between 8:00 a.m. and 6:00 p.m., and Monday, August 15th, between 8:00 a.m. and noon. Grange booths must be in place by Noon on Monday, August 15th.
- D. If you are unable to bring your entry on entry day, please make arrangements to have someone bring it for you. We will not be accepting early entries prior to entry date.
- E. Lane County Fair employees and/or their representatives are not responsible for lost, stolen or damaged items.
- F. Exhibitors are awarded only one (1) premium monies per class per individual owner. Premiums will be paid out on Saturday, August 20th, between 11:00 a.m. and 3:00 p.m. Premiums that are not picked up will be mailed out by check no later than September 30th.
- G. All entries need to be picked up on Monday, August 22nd between Noon and 6:00 p.m. Any entries left after 6:00 p.m. will become the Coordinator's responsibility for disposition.
- H. Wooden flats and paper plates will be furnished for individual exhibits. Full flats are 12" x 18". Half flats are 12" x 9". Paper plates are varying sizes. **DO NOT BRING IMMATURE EXHIBITS.**
- I. In sections where a class for "other varieties" is included, this class will be judged together for one premium.
- J. Only products entered in the Land Products Department may be displayed during the Fair, unless arrangements have been made through the Department Coordinator or Exhibits Office.

SPECIAL EXHIBITS - SECTIONS 852 & 853

- 1. Articles entered in these sections will NOT be allowed to compete for premiums in any other section.
- 2. All exhibits in these sections must be made up from the products of one farm.
- 3. The number of varieties should be as many as would be consistent with best farming methods.
- 4. Diversification is important to show sufficient range of farm operations.
- 5. The products should possess quality. An exhibit is scored on utility. If the display shows articles not demanded by the market, they lack utility.
- 6. The display should be neatly arranged and have an objective point to show the practice of diversification carried out on the farm.
- 7. Produce displayed in these sections must be of top quality and must be replaced as necessary to maintain display during Fair.
- 8. No Exhibit entered at previous Lane County Fairs may compete.
- 9. Exhibits in Sections 852 & 853 must score at least 75 points to participate in awards.
- 10. Scoring is as follows:

Arrangement and Display.....	15 points
Variety.....	25 points
Quality.....	40 points
Utility.....	20 points
Total.....	100 points

SECTION

850 Community Collective Exhibit

CLASS:

1. Display

- Limited to Agricultural Organizations and Agricultural Products.
- All articles shown must be products of the community claiming credit for the exhibit. (Can include home processed foods)
- Community Exhibits **MUST** be in place and complete by Noon on Monday, August 15th. Perishable products may be replaced with like items during the Fair. Make arrangements with Grange Coordinator for entry to replace items.
- To receive credit, sufficient quantity and variety of farm products must be shown.
- All Agricultural Organizations having a credible display that has been pre-registered (**by July 31st**) will receive \$200 & a Rosette Ribbon.
- The space provided for display booths is approximately 10'x10'. The display booth will be approximately 10' wide, 8' deep, with an 8' high back and a sloping display area of 24 to 43 inches.
- The People's Choice awards are given to the top 3 displays. Fair attendees are encouraged to vote for their favorite display. Winners receive financial awards from three local utilities: Blachly-Lane Electric Cooperative, EPUD, and Lane Electric Cooperative.

RULES FOR SECTIONS 854, 855, 856 & 857

- A. All threshed grain, grasses and legumes must be exhibited in quantities of one-quart clear glass jars only.
- B. Grain and grass sheaves should be bright clear straw, tightly tied not less than 3" in diameter. All other exhibits **MUST** be 4" or more at butts & tightly tied. Tie all sheaves with string.
- C. In selecting grain and grass materials for exhibits, the material should be gathered just as the exhibit matures, selecting even heads in length and size. Keep in a cool place until prepared for exhibit. Grains should be stripped when the material is just past full bloom or while the leaves are dark in color.
- D. Garden herb exhibits require 4 or more healthy sprigs or specimens, to be shown fresh. **BRING YOUR OWN CONTAINER FOR WATER.**

NOTE: No added scenery will be allowed.
- C. Entries will be on display for the entire length of the Fair.
- D. Entries will be judged on originality, workmanship, creativity and condition of materials used, by Land Products Judge for premium award and will also be judged by "People's Choice" ballot.

Contest Rules

- A. Contestants must be 10 years or younger. One Entry per person. Contestant will get in FREE on Wednesday, August 17, 2011, until 1:00 pm if they bring in a dressed up fruit or vegetable. The contestants will be divided into 3 categories according to ages:
Category 1: 2, 3 and 4 year olds
Category 2: 5, 6 and 7 year olds,
Category 3: 8, 9 and 10 year olds.
- A. The Entries must be received at the Grange area outside of Expo 1 no later than 2:00pm on Wednesday, August 17.
- B. The judging will be conducted by three Pomona Grange members.
- C. The Judging will be based on such attributes as originality, imagination, presentation, and appearance.
- D. Winners will be posted Wednesday, August 17th, by 3:30 pm
- E. The top three winners will receive the following:
First Place: \$25 plus a season pass to the Fair
Second Place: \$15 plus a two day pass to the Fair
Third Place: \$10 plus a one day pass to the Fair
Each entry will receive a Participation Ribbon and Honorable Mention Ribbons will be awarded in each category.

SOME HELPFUL TIPS FOR ENTERING IN THE LAND PRODUCTS DEPARTMENT:

A good entry consists of some of the following:

- A. Trueness to Type: Should be typical of the variety in shape, color and size.
- B. Quality/Condition: **Should be edible, in prime condition**, without blemishes or damage from insects, disease and handling. Deepest color is preferred.
- C. Uniformity: Should be alike in size, shape, color, texture and stage of maturity.

JACKPOT PRIZE

All entries to the Land Products Department Sections 854 through 869 will be eligible for a \$200 Jackpot prize sponsored by Lane Pomona Grange. This prize is given to promote entries in the Land Products area. One winner will be drawn from all entries then posted at the Lane Pomona table and notified on Wednesday during the Fair.
